

VOTER INTIMIDATION PREVENTION GUIDE



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THE 75-FOOT RULE

ARIZONA LAW SETS A 75-FOOT PERIMETER AROUND EACH VOTING LOCATION TO CREATE A SAFE PLACE TO VOTE.

WHO IS ALLOWED INSIDE THE 75-FOOT LIMIT?

- Voters (plus minors accompanying the voter and voter assistants)
- Election officials
- Authorized observers

WHAT IS PROHIBITED INSIDE THE 75-FOOT LIMIT?

- Campaigning/electioneering
- Poll workers and observers (but not voters) are prohibited from wearing clothing with political messages
- Carrying firearms or weapons
- Taking pictures or videos

ELECTION OBSERVER RULES

CREDENTIALLED OBSERVERS ARE PERMITTED TO:

- Enter the voting location
- Observe the activity

CREDENTIALLED OBSERVERS ARE PROHIBITED FROM:

- Obstructing poll workers or the voting process
- Interacting with voters
- Taking video or pictures
- Being unprofessional or failing to follow directions from election officials

NON-CREDENTIALLED OBSERVERS INCLUDE:

- Interest groups
- Candidates
- Media

Non-credentialed observers are only permitted outside the 75-foot perimeter

NON-CREDENTIALLED OBSERVERS ARE PROHIBITED FROM:

- Obstructing access to voting
- Engaging in conduct that may threaten, harass, or intimidate voters

WHAT IS VOTER INTIMIDATION?

Discriminatory conduct and voter intimidation is unlawful.

- Any activity that has the intent or effect of threatening, harassing, or intimidating voters —whether in or outside of the 75-foot-limit — is unlawful.
- Discrimination against voters based on race, ethnicity, national origin, language, religion, or disability is also punishable under law.


EXAMPLES OF ACTIVITY THAT MAY AMOUNT TO INTIMIDATION AT THE VOTING LOCATION:

- Aggressive or ostentatious display of weapons;
- Using threatening, insulting, or offensive language to a voter or poll worker;
- Blocking the entrance to a voting location or disrupting voting lines;
- Intentionally disseminating false or misleading information;
- Impersonating a law enforcement officer to deter, intimidate, or harass voters;
- Confronting or questioning voters in a harassing or intimidating manner.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU WITNESS VOTER INTIMIDATION:

- Inform a poll worker, or call 911 if anyone is in immediate danger.
- Report it to the Secretary of State at azsos.gov/IncidentForm or 1-877-THE-VOTE.

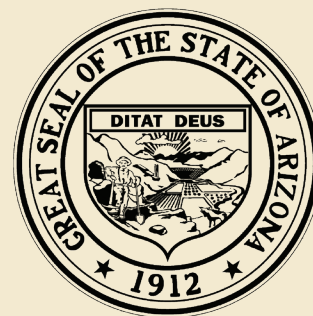


CAN ANYONE HELP RETURN A BALLOT? NO.

This is currently prohibited by law; although there are four exceptions.

- **Caregiver:** a person who provides medical or health care assistance to the voter in a residence or caregiving facility.
- **Family member:** a person related to the voter by blood, marriage, adoption or legal guardianship.
- **Household member:** a person who resides with the voter.
- **Election official:** a person working in an official capacity to support election administration.
